Favourite Christmas Hymn

What is your favourite Christmas hymn? Do you feel disappointment it is not included at any point in the Christmas Season (which, incidentally, in the church calendar, starts on Christmas Eve and not some time in October! But do let us know your favourite and you may not be disappointed ③)

My favourite is 'O come, O come Immanuel', and was traditionally sung on the seven days at the end of advent (so, if we are really being traditional I have it too early, oh well!)

I love it not because of the tune, which I do like, but because it is a hymn that is so full of longing and hope. It transports us back in time to the longing of the nation of Israel for a redeemer and brings us right into present times. As I sing, I think of all that the nation of Israel suffered at the hands of foreign powers, of their longing for the coming of the Messiah to free them from the tyranny of others. As I sing, I reflect upon all that isn't going well in the world just now. Every year there is much upon which to reflect, these past two years it has been Covid and it has been the sorrows and sadness we have all experienced. Each year brings its own troubles. This wonderful hymn is a constant reminder of the hope we have in Jesus.

The hymn refers to Jesus and we encounter Him in every verse.

O come O come Emmanuel...

Isaiah 7.14: The Lord himself will give you a sign; the young woman, pregnant and about to bear a son, shall name him Emmanuel

Matthew 1.23: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us").

It is strewn with phrases that we hardly ever use:

O come thou rod/branch of Jesse...

Isaiah 11:1-2 There shall come forth a Rod from the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots; a reference to the promise that from the line of King David (Jesse's son) the Messiah will come. (see also Matthew 1.6)

O come thou key of David come...

Isaiah 22.22 "I will place on his shoulder the key to the house of David; what he opens no one can shut, and what he shuts no one can open."

Revelation 3.7 "And to the angel of the church in Philadelphia write: 'The words of the holy one, the true one, who has the key of David, who opens and no one will shut, who shuts and no one opens.

This promised king, Jesus, whose authority cannot be challenged, this Jesus who has the final say in the history of creation.

O come thou dayspring from on high...

Luke 1:77 – 78 And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Highest; For you will go before the face of the Lord to prepare His ways, To give knowledge of salvation to His people by the remission of their sins, through the tender mercy of our God, with which the Dayspring from on high has visited us;

John the Baptist will announce the arrival of 'Dayspring' a metaphor for Jesus, the one who brings the light of heaven into the darkness of this world. Reminiscent of the words of another hymn, 'yet in the dark streets shineth the everlasting light, the hopes and fears of the all the years are met in the tonight'.

O come thou Lord of might...

Exodus 15.11 "Who is like you, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like you, majestic in holiness, awesome in glorious deeds, doing wonders?"

John 1.1-3 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. Here we find that this Jesus is God almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

This Lord of might is the creator, the do-er of miracles, the mighty redeemer, Jesus is this Lord of might and power, he is the one who is majestic and holy.

Most of all this hymn calls us to rejoice because the messiah has come and will come again (have a wee read at John 14).

So, let us rejoice that Emmanuel will return

Revelation 22.12-13 "Behold, I am coming soon! My reward is with me, and I will give to each person according to what they have done. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the First and the Last, the Beginning and the End."

These are the reasons this is my favourite hymn to sing as we approach Christmas. These words keep me focused on the great wonder of the incarnation. It is a glorious reminder that in dark times we live with great hope.

As we prepare for Christmas, let us avoid being distracted by the "commercial" or "cultural" Christmas around us and focus on the one thing Christmas is really about—the Incarnation of the Son of God. "For I have come down from heaven... to do... the will of him who sent me... this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks on the Son and believes in him should have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day." (Xmas and Christmas: A Lost Chapter from Herodotus." CS Lewis, 1954)



Getting to know you...

Interview with Rev Terry Taylor, speaking to Sandra MacKenzie

A friend of mine has just finished his PhD on the topic of St Bernard and whether or not he owed his sanctity to his life within the monastery or outwith it and that came back to my mind when I was looking at my interview notes from my meeting with our minister. Does Terry owe her goodness and her piety and all her other special qualities to her life *before* she became a minister or *after* her training and ordination?

She grew up as an ordinary wee girl (her own words) in Pollok in Glasgow and was the eldest of six children; she had two brothers and three sisters. Terry was raised in the Roman Catholic faith. She made good friends and some of them remain her friends to this day. She remembers they used to go out with a radio and would listen to Radio Caroline and Radio Luxembourg on the steps of some tenement – until they were chased!

"We didn't have much," said Terry, "But we didn't know it because everyone was the same. And one of my clearest memories is that everyone shared. Everyone was kind."

She enjoyed school and remembers teachers who were caring and encouraging. She lived near to her gran and had to pass her house on the way to and from school but she remembers she never passed her door without popping in to say hello. Regular attenders at the South Parish will remember many references to Terry's gran, a woman of great faith.

"I learned about hope from my gran," remembers Terry. "She had a difficult life but never ever lost her belief that God is good."

Terry attended Lourdes Secondary School in Cardonald and was there for five years.

"I was a real blether and could probably have done better," said Terry with a wry smile. Then she just happened to mention that when she was 14 she developed TB and spent three months in Mearnskirk Hospital and had actually been quite unwell for some time before that probably losing out on nearly a year of school work. I think when she says she didn't do quite as well in her O Grades and Highers as she might have done it was probably more due to that than blethering! When she was almost 16 Graham Taylor and his family moved into the same block of flats as Terry's family and thus began a romance which has lasted now for about 50 years. Terry remembers that Graham's mother had her eye on Terry's sister Josephine for her son but Graham had other ideas! Terry and Graham were married in St Conval's Church when Terry was 18. She remembers a friend telling her she was too young to get married.

"But while Graham and I will celebrate our Golden Wedding Anniversary quite soon she's now on her third husband," said Terry with a mischievous smile.

Terry and Graham started married life in a flat in Cumbernauld and Terry worked as a shorthand typist with Glasgow Corporation and Graham as a trainee transport manager with a road haulage company. Prior to that Graham had worked with Alliance Box Company where he made her the famous paper clip necklace which she told us about one Sunday.

Terry stopped her work as a shorthand typist when they had their children Tracy and David and they moved to a house in Bo'ness in 1978 after Graham started work with BP in Grangemouth. Terry remembers with great fondness bringing up her family in Bo'ness. Graham worked continental shifts which meant that every five to six weeks he had ten days off.

"This meant we could spend a lot of time together which certainly helped our marriage,' said Terry. "He was very involved with the children and very good about the house."

They made lots of friends in Bo'ness and Terry obviously loved that part of her life. They were there for more than 25 years.

But what about Terry's faith during this time? She doesn't remember a time when she didn't believe in God but she also remembers she only attended Mass occasionally.

Everything changed in November 1987 when her beloved daddy died. It's obvious he was a major influence in her life.

"He was a Red Clydesider and had a great sense of justice," said Terry.

"He gave me a copy of Robert Tressell's novel 'The Ragged Trousered Philanthropists' when I was 14. He was also an agnostic and I remember when he was in hospital, dying, I prayed really hard for him to have faith. A neighbour told me she had asked her minister to go and have a word with him in hospital and I was really worried he would tell him to take a running jump! After he died we discovered that he had started to keep a notebook about faith after that visit and died a week later."

That same young pastor came to visit Terry's family after her dad died and it was a pivotal moment for Terry.

"It wasn't that he told me anything about Jesus that I didn't already know," said Terry, "But it was as if the penny dropped."

And that was the beginning of Terry's journey which culminated in her becoming a minister and more especially for us - OUR minister.



Penny writes:

"I know that some of you know lots and are already making commitments to reduce your own carbon footprints but it can feel overwhelming. I hoped that by sharing these insights I might raise the subject a bit higher up the consciousness of my friends who are less steeped in the subject. In turn, if you just talk about it to someone you usually wouldn't, that's already a step of influence which I can't have and you can.

We probably all know the main things we can do, and each of us have different lives where some are more feasible than others but even one of the below is better than none:

- Use your voice: keep this in conversations with friends, colleagues and family
- Use your vote: for the parties who have highest commitments to decarbonization
- Waste less: everything we consume contains carbon, at least don't throw it away: food, clothes, furniture, fuel, even internet!
- Switch your home energy tariff to a green one, insulate your home better, put in a heat pump or solar or both
- Buy a more efficient car next time you change
- Walk, cycle or take more public transport
- Reduce the meat, especially beef and lamb, and dairy in your diet and be mindful of where your food comes from
- Don't hop straight back on the plane for work or leisure if there's an alternative, bundle the journeys if you must make them.
- Plant your own tree and tend it, offset as a last resource.

One of the great communicators I follow says the best advice is to care, because then you will work out what your contribution can be."

Memories of Jim Muir

I recall Jim coming to the BB in the South Parish as an officer in the 60s. My first memory is of him taking drill and putting us through our paces. I remember thinking that he was quite a stern man and we were all a bit afraid of him. I soon realised that he was a lot of fun when you got to know him. He got the boys to put on a play about Cinderella which was written in rhyme. I got the part of the baddie but I got my comeuppance by the end!

Jim also put on another play but managed to get the Girls Brigade to play the female parts. One boy and one girl were singing a hit of the time – Cinderella Rockefella. Being teenage boys in the BB we teased them a lot about being an item, but the romance was strictly an onstage one!

I recall being in the session room in a class that Jim was taking one Friday night. Another boy a couple of years older than me was training to be an officer and had been given the job of timekeeper for the evening. Towards the end of the class he put his head round the door and stuck up two fingers and shouted "Two minutes!" Unfortunately he had shown the two fingers round the wrong way and Jim had to show him the appropriate gesture!

In 1969 the BB had their summer camp in Ramsey on the Isle of Man and Jim and his family were there. We had a great holiday and while we were there the first men landed on the moon.

Fred Hearle, who took over as BB Captain from Jim, told me a couple of stories about Jim which illustrate his fun side.

The BB were at camp in Arbroath and some of the boys were wearing long trousers instead of shorts. A football tournament had been arranged and while all the boys were away, Jim went round their cases and removed all the long trousers!

Fred also told me that Jim could be described as a wind-up merchant. Apparently he used to tell visitors to the South Parish that he intended to turn the big hall there into a swimming pool. His idea was that there would be a rising floor so that the hall could be used as normal and then lowered to make a swimming pool. What a way to impress visitors!

Jim became an elder in the South Parish in 1970 and also took over as Captain after Adam Davidson passed away. He and Eileen left the South Parish in the early 80s and joined the Congregational Church in Carnegie Hill which became the URC and served there faithfully for over 40 years.

We kept in touch as the URC is involved together in the Murray Churches Partnership. Jim had a lot of roles in the church and he and Eileen ran weekly church lunches for a number of years. Jim was a great soup maker and I'm told that haggis soup was his speciality! They also helped to run a club for the residents of Fraser River Tower and I recall a lovely evening there when Elizabeth and I treated them to a singalong.

When I emailed South Parish contacts about Jim's passing, I got some lovely comments. Here are a few -

"He was a lovely man and will be missed by many."

"I met him a few times and he was always great chat and obviously loved the BB."

And from a former GB officer - "What an absolute gentleman he was. I have fond memories of him helping out with the GB and being bossed about by Eileen!"

Jim's funeral took place on 18th November and it was great to see a number of BB boys from Jim's time in the company in attendance.

Some former officers paraded the company colours at the crematorium.

For me Jim was a sincere man whom I respected. He had a great sense of fun and he did his best to serve his Lord by serving others in a great many ways.




EK foodbank update

From the end of November until mid December we start offering clients the chance of buying low cost toys at amazing prices which helps them spread the cheer when on such a tight budget. At the end of November we also open the ordering system for a Christmas day Hamper which contains all food necessities to create and enjoy a beautiful dinner on the day. We then distribute these parcels to the clients at home and this year that takes place on 23rd December. In order to provide the items needed for the hampers EK foodbank are encouraging people who can, to take part in their reverse advent calendar. For each day in advent instead of opening a door on an advent calendar, why not pop an item into a bag/box that is needed to make up the parcels, details of the items suggested can be found on EK Community Foodbank Facebook page.

In relation to what has been happening in our Foodbank this past year I honestly don't know where to begin. My husband Joe and myself, have been manning the outreach every Thursday with a few wee days off provided by Donna, Douglas and Stuart, to which we are extremely grateful. Increasingly over the year we have seen so many families new and recurring visit each week. The families are eternally grateful each week for the help and support our team provide by hosting an outreach at our church. On a Friday we have a team who help at the main unit organising bag packing, sorting through donations and many other duties. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Claire, Wendy, Stuart, Graham, Ishbel and Iain. You guys do a fantastic job behind the scenes! So far with the encouraging prayers we have had a few successes of clients who have found employment and thankfully no longer need the help of the foodbank, the great works of Gods power working in our community!

I would like to thank our Church family for all the support you have given to my family, the Foodbank Team at South Parish and we would like to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and Gods' blessings for the New Year.
