
Bible Study

O come, all you unfaithful

We were at a Christmas concert the other night and heard this song for the first time. It struck a chord, as we are so used to singing *O come, all ye faithful*. We all have had a hard time over the past two or three years and I was interested in finding out what was behind the song. It was written by Lisa Clow, with music by Bob Kauflin.

Lisa tells her story -

"I was struggling. It had been a long year and a half. Finances were stressful, I miscarried twins, and on top of it I was battling a deep relational bitterness. My church was having their annual service where they kick off the Christmas season with carols and special songs and I, for once, was not singing. I told them that I wouldn't be able to sing, but what they didn't know is that I was too overcome with shame to stand on stage before my church.

That Sunday morning, I stood at my seat as they began to sing "O Come All Ye Faithful" and the first line of the song just clobbered me. It hit me like a giant wave of guilt.

O come all you faithful, joyful and triumphant!

I remember hearing those words and thinking, "I have been so unfaithful. My joy has dwindled, and I am a triumphant...failure." And I didn't sing the rest of the service.

I drove home, my mind still churning, "Is that really who is invited to come to Jesus? The faithful? The joyful? The triumphant? If so, then I am hopeless."

Thankfully, later that afternoon the Holy Spirit reminded me of Jesus's invitation in Matthew 11:28,

"Come to me all who are weary and heavy laden and I will give you rest."

Rest found in his life, his death, and his resurrection, not my own.

That evening, I had a strong conviction to write a song for myself and for the weary, the broken, and the ashamed."

Here are the words of her song -

O come, all you unfaithful

O come, all you unfaithful Come, weak and unstable Come, know you are not alone

O come, barren and waiting ones Weary of praying, come See what your God has done Christ is born, Christ is born Christ is born for you

O come, bitter and broken Come with fears unspoken Come, taste of His perfect love

O come, guilty and hiding ones There is no need to run See what your God has done

He's the Lamb who was given
Slain for our pardon
His promise is peace
For those who believe

So come, though you have nothing Come, He is the offering Come, see what your God has done


Anna Cossar wishes all her friends at the South Parish Church a very Happy Christmas and all the very best for 2023.



Energy Bills Support Scheme



"Fraudsters are pretending to be from Ofgem. If you receive a call or email telling you to apply for your energy bill rebate, ignore it. Ofgem will apply rebates automatically."

The point of the notice is correct – though it's your electricity supplier, not Ofgem, who will apply the rebate.

Full details of the Energy Bills Support Scheme discount are on the UK Government website at https://www.gov.uk/guidance/getting-the-energy-bills-support-scheme-discount

If you're not on the internet, the main points are as follows:

The Energy Bills Support Scheme provides a £400 non-repayable discount to all households with a domestic electricity connection to help with their energy bills over winter 2022 to 2023. The discount is automatic. If you get a message asking for you to apply for it, or for any personal or financial details, it is most likely to be a scam.

Even though both electricity and gas costs have increased for everyone (including the supply companies!) over the last several months, the £400 discount is being provided only through electricity bills.

How you'll get the discount

You do not need to apply for the discount, and there's no need to contact your energy supplier. Your electricity supplier should already have provided

you with information and guidance about the discount scheme. It started in October 2022, so if you have not received your first instalments by now, please contact your supplier.

The discount will be applied to your monthly household electricity bill for 6 months starting in October 2022. You'll get:

- £66 in October and November
- £67 in December, January, February and March

You'll get the discount monthly, even if you pay for your energy quarterly or use a payment card.



If you pay your electricity bill by **direct debit**, you'll get the discount either as a reduction to your monthly direct debit amount, or a refund to your bank account following the monthly direct debit collection.

If you pay by standard **credit or payment card**, the discount will be applied as a credit to your account in the first week of each month. The credit will appear as it would if you had made a payment.

If you have a **smart prepayment meter**, the discount will be credited directly to your smart prepayment meter in the first week of each month.

If you have a **traditional prepayment meter**, you'll get the discount from the first week of each month. Your electricity supplier will let you know in advance how you will get your discount. You'll get either:

 redeemable vouchers (sent by SMS text, email or post), which you'll need to redeem at a top-up point. Your supplier will tell you which top-up points can redeem the vouchers, for example at a Post Office branch or a PayPoint shop

or

an automatic credit when you top up at your usual top up point.

It's a bit more complicated if you rent, and you pay for your electricity as part of your rent. In that case, you need to reach an agreement with your landlord about how the discount will be applied to your rent payments.

To sum up:

- The Energy Bills Support Scheme will give each household a discount of £400 on your electricity bill, in six instalments spread over the period from October 2022 to March 2023.
- The discount is automatic. You do not have to apply for it. If you get
 a message asking for you to apply for it, or for any personal or financial details, it is most likely to be a scam.
- Your electricity supplier will apply the discount, in a way that depends on how you pay your bills. The supplier should have already provided you with information about the method by which you will get the discount.
- You should already have received the first one or two instalments of the discount. If you haven't, please contact your electricity supplier.
