#### From the Manse

This past year has been so difficult. Many of us are feeling the effects of all that we have lost, all that we have missed. It has been a year of uncertainties. We have listened to political leaders and medical experts give us so much information, we've heard statistics, kept up to date with the regulations and restrictions - hoped and prayed that we will move through the different levels in the right direction. Many of us have lost loved ones during this time, some to the virus itself. We all have our own story as well as our shared story of this pandemic.

We have come from the season of Easter and this coming Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> May, we'll celebrate Pentecost, remembering the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on those first witnesses of the resurrection. They too had come through a time of uncertainty; they'd witnessed the death of Jesus and experienced the darkness and pain of loss. But Jesus rose from the dead bringing them hope and with that hope came his command to take His good news to the whole world. And so, they proclaimed, as He had done, the time of God's favour, and they spoke and lived the values of God's upside down Kingdom. (Read Matthew 5) By their words and by how they lived they did turn the world upside down (Acts 17:6).

They did so, not in their own strength but in the power of the Holy Spirit. Those who had been hiding for fear of the Jews became those who openly proclaimed the Good News of Jesus, for the Spirit of God dwelt in them empowering them, giving them courage.

The Spirit was poured out on that day of Pentecost - the same Holy Spirit is still active in the Church today. As we take time to pray, as we reflect on the scriptures, we do so to hear God's Spirit speak to us, to lead us and guide us into His future, where His purpose for us as a congregation is good. It may be a future that is very different from the past, for God is the God of new things. New things that remind us of his care for us, new things that lead us towards his good purpose for the whole of creation.

**Isaiah 43** "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.

I believe God is doing a new thing with us. Now, I know it is hard to let go of our how things used to be. We are not people who are to be stuck in the past, longing for the way things used to be. We are to be people who trust that God has a future for us. Romans chapter 8 is a great chapter to read for encouragement.

Here is Eugene Petersen's paraphrase of Romans 8:31 - 39

So, what do you think? With God on our side like this, how can we lose? If God didn't hesitate to put everything on the line for us, embracing our condition and exposing himself to the worst by sending his own Son, is there anything else he wouldn't gladly and freely do for us? And who would dare tangle with God by messing with one of God's chosen? Who would dare even to point a finger? The One who died for us—who was raised to life for us! - is in the presence of God at this very moment sticking up for us. Do you think anyone is going to be able to drive a wedge between us and Christ's love for us? There is no way! Not trouble, not hard times, not hatred, not hunger, not homelessness, not bullying threats, not backstabbing, not even the worst sins listed in Scripture.

Paul reminds the Christians in Rome of how committed God is to his people. He didn't spare his own son, but gave him up for us all, how will he not graciously, along with Him, give us all good things. There are countless places in scripture where we are reminded of the mystery of how God works

May God grant us the wisdom to trust His love, that we may go into the future encouraged and willing to love and serve Him and to love and serve our community.

# **By Gentle Powers**

It's been a year like no other with our lives being put on hold and plans made having to be abandoned. Things changed quite a bit for me after I suffered a mild stroke in February but I was thankful and humbled by the prayers and good wishes from the church family. I know too that Elizabeth, Lesley and David appreciated the messages and support at the time. We'd like to thank you all for your concern.

Fifty years ago I set off to spend a year as a foreign languages assistant in Schweinfurt, Motherwell and Wishaw's twin town in Germany. I made a number of friends during my year there and I'm still hopeful that I'll be able to pay a return visit later this year or in 2022 to mark the fifty years since I went there. One of my friends, Bernd, has kept in regular touch over the years and he visited East Kilbride with his wife and daughters about twenty years ago. The family also attended worship in the South Parish during their stay. Elizabeth and I were also happy to attend their younger daughter Christina's confirmation in Germany a year or so later. You can imagine how sad we were recently to get a text from their elder daughter Sonja that her mum, Ulrike, had suffered a brain haemorrhage and stroke and was in hospital in an induced coma. After two weeks in the coma Ulrike was able to regain consciousness. As I write this Ulrike hasn't been able to speak yet but is showing that she is aware of things, reacting to words and songs and showing some emotion when her grandchildren speak to her. Sonja told me about a favourite hymn that they had been singing to Ulrike. The hymn had been written by Dietrich Bonhoeffer and I'd like to share it with you. This hymn is frequently sung in Germany at the end of the year, but, as we've just come to the end of basically a year's lockdown, its words are still appropriate.

The protestant theologian, church leader, and resistance member Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote the inspiring and melancholic words as a prayer toward the end of his 2-year imprisonment by the Nazis. He sent it to his family as an encouragement and profession of faith in December of 1944, just eight weeks before he was executed (and four months before Nazi Germany's capitulation). Bonhoeffer's life, witness, and death gave the song special resonance at the turn of the year.

The past year has been filled with worry and anxiety, where people have felt burdened and frightened by their personal and political situation. We have been under siege by contagious viruses, the virus of hatred and the Covid virus. The text of the hymn is comforting and allows us to walk into the future cradling hope.

So whether you find yourself lonely or loved, harried or hopeful, anxious or assured, may the words of this hymn comfort you and may God's gentle powers embrace you.

# The Kippen Vine

Once again, as so often during the last year, I enjoyed joining the South Parish Community for a recent Sunday worship. Terry's reading was from John and Hazel delivered a very imaginative presentation on vines and grapes—the theme for the service. It made me think about the story of another vine—one close to my home and heart—which I would love to share with you.

Kippen, where I live, is a very small village in Stirlingshire: an unlikely setting for a grapevine with a global reputation for its massive proportions! Nevertheless, in its heyday The Kippen Vine regularly produced around 2000 bunches of grapes and stretched across more than 300 feet – quite an achievement.

People came from far and wide to visit the vine: coach-loads of visitors were awestruck at the scale of the operation and, in true Scottish fashion, after their tour enjoyed tea and cakes, served by local youngsters. I have this first hand from my friend, Elma, who was one of the young people in the village grateful for the chance of a job so close to home during the school holidays!

The story starts in 1891 when Duncan Buchanan, a local man, bought cuttings from a grapevine in Clovenfords in the Borders and brought them to Kippen. He nurtured the grapevine so well that within 20 years it was producing 600 bunches a year overtaking London's much older Hampton Court vine. At its peak this number reached almost 3,250. By 1922 it was recorded as the world's largest vine. It had become a tourist attraction and put Kippen on the map.


Over the years the cultivation and care of the vine was taken on by other members of the Buchanan family, but the costs and increasing efforts required to maintain it, became overwhelming. Sadly and tragically, it was cut down in 1964 amid feelings of despair.

While the record-breaking vine itself is mostly a fading memory, offshoots continue to exist in gardens and greenhouses in the area. Following our own move to Kippen in the eighties, we bought a second-hand greenhouse from a member of the Buchanan family—it came with a vine grown from an offshoot of the original grapevine. We were thrilled although I will admit that we were slightly daunted by the responsibility of ensuring its survival. Fortunately, we have managed to keep it alive (with only a couple of wobbles!) and every year we enjoy a good harvest of grapes. A wreath, fashioned from prunings, adorns our front door at Christmas.

Happily, Conservationists have also taken steps to make sure that relatives of the vine will continue to exist for generations to come. Cuttings were taken from a plant saved from the Kippen vine some years ago and transported to Culzean Castle. In doing so the Kippen Grape-vine story comes almost full circle: Duncan Buchanan, who brought the grapevine to Kippen, was a former top gardener at the castle.

Although the grapevine is no longer a feature of the village, tales of its glory live on in villagers' memories. Attempts have been made to guarantee that this important part of Kippen's history is not forgotten. There is an area of housing called "Old Vinery" built on the former site of the famous greenhouse, the local newsletter is called "The Grapevine" and to ensure that the younger generation do not forget, an image of the vine is incorporated into the school badge of Kippen Primary School.


